The big news this week is from the southeast, where a potential first state record for WHITE-WINGED DOVE appeared on the deck and at the feeder of Nelson Hoskins in Ottumwa on April 8, soon after the strong airflow pattern from the southwest. The bird was seen daily for a week, and was well photographed. Unfortunately it disappeared on the 15th. Other highlights are CINNAMON TEAL in the central, RED-THROATED LOON in the northeast, and PACIFIC LOON, GLAUCOUS GULL and CINNAMON TEAL in the northwest. Some of the returning birds first reported this past week included BLUE-GRAY GNATCATCHER, YELLOW-HEADED BLACKBIRD, NORTHERN PARULA, BROAD-WINGED HAWK, and OSPREY.

In the central in Polk County, a CINNAMON TEAL was found on the 19th at the north end of Big Creek State Park, reached via 150th Street off hiway 415. On the 17th in Tama County, two SANDHILL CRANES, three LECONTE'S SPARROWS, and a BLACK-CROWNED NIGHT HERON were seen from the east end of the south dike at Otter Creek Marsh. Ten SANDHILL CRANES reportedly returned to Otter Creek this spring, and the best place to look for these birds is from the intersection of county road E-66 and R Avenue, by viewing the fields to the south. In Story County, AMERICAN BITTERNS were at Ames and near Luther on the 14th. In Boone County, three GREAT-TAILED GRACKLES and 21 WHITE-FRONTED GEESE were spotted at Harrier Marsh just south of Ogden on the 17th.

In the northeast in Linn County, a RED-THROATED LOON in basic plumage,

discovered at Pleasant Creek Recreation Area north of Palo on the 13th, was last reported on the 17th. COMMON LOONS, HORNED GREBES, and an EARED GREBE were also seen there the past week. In Jones County, a PINE WARBLER was at the north end of Muskrat Slough on the 20th.

In the northwest in Dickinson County, the PACIFIC LOON was still being seen through the 20th in North Bay of West Okoboji Lake, and on the 15th, a GLAUCOUS GULL was on Angler's Bay in the northeast corner of Big Spirit Lake. A CINNAMON TEAL was at Dugout Creek south of Lake Park on the 19th, and a flock of BREWER'S BLACKBIRDS was at Spring Run.

In the southeast in Van Buren County, LOUISIANA WATERTHRUSHES and YELLOW-THROATED WARBLERS were seen at Lacey-Keosauqua State Park on the 19th, and in Johnson County, a YELLOW-THROATED WARBLER was at the entrance to the Cottage Reserve Area at Lake MacBride State Park on the 17th. In Des Moines County, a NORTHERN MOCKINGBIRD was observed at the JI Case Co. proving ground north of Burlington on the 18th.
