Bird Banding.

In 1922 I became interested in bird banding, a project carried on by the Biological Survey, Washington D.C. I obtained the federal permit and supplies and carried on until 1931. Farming being time consming, my banding operations were carried on mainly during the spring and fall migration periods. Compared to results of numbers banded, my total number of bands placed on birds, the total was small. Present day banders, with the time for the work, band in one month more then I did during these years. One big factor was improvement in methods and traps. Especially the mist net process gave a terrific boost to the number of bands placed each year. After 1931 illness in the family and other factors caused me to suspend operations. About a year later I received notice from Washinton to send in my permit. The letter was cold and ill worded. I wrote making known my trouble without going too much into details. I suggested that we have a sort of "leave of absence" until I could resume, which I very much had in mind. I did not hear anything in responce. A month or two later I had a visit from the fereral game warden, who had orders to lift my permit and any supplies on hand. This together with a quote from the letter received. that I "probably had lost interest" decied me to drop the whole project. The species and number banded by me follows.
