An immature RED-SHOULDERED HAWK was along hiway 26 about a mile south of Fish Farm Mounds.

The week's best birds are OLDSQUAW in three different locations, and SNOWY OWL and SPOTTED TOWHEE in the northeast.

In the northeast in Linn County, an OLDSQUAW and a HORNED GREBE were seen at Cedar Lake in Cedar Rapids on the 24th, the same location that an immature BLACK-CROWNED NIGHT HERON was still present on the 19th. At Marion, Jim and Joyce Durbin have had an immature RED-SHOULDERED HAWK take up residence in their backyard for over a week now. You can call for updates and driections at (319)377-7194. In Cerro Gordo County, the female SPOTTED TOWHEE and a RED-BREASTED NUTHATCH were still visiting the feeder of Curt Nelson north of Rock Falls on the 24th. In Fayette County, a SNOWY OWL was observed in a bean field along hiway 93 about five miles east of Sumner on the 20th, but no subsequent sightings have been reported. In Winneshiek County, the nine REDHEADS on the overflow from the Decorah Trout Hatchery on the 20th were a first winter record for the county, as were the four GADWALL on the 13th.

In the central in Polk County, the OLDSQUAW was as much as a quarter mile downstream from the Saylorville Reservoir Dam on the 21rst, while after two months the BROWN THRASHER was still in Jane Clark's yard at Clive on the 21rst. In Boone County, another BROWN THRASHER was still visiting Mike Hovlik's feeder in Madrid on the 20th. In Warren County, two NORTHERN SHRIKES were seen on the 18th, along the southbound lanes of I-35, one at

mile marker #63, and the other about five miles farther south.

In the southeast in Johnson County, the lowa River in the lowa City area has hosted some interesting birds recently. The female OLDSQUAW was still being seen on the 24th just below the RR bridge over Riverside Drive. The exotic of the week, a male MANDARIN DUCK was last reported from the area of the lowa Memorial Union and the CRANDIC RR bridge on the 20th, and the TUNDRA SWAN and five TRUMPETER SWANS north of town were last seen from the Birdline's house at 6 Longview Knoll, on the 23rd. At the Hawkeye Wildlife Area, a SAW-WHET OWL was in a cedar grove along the north side of the Amana Road (F-20), 0.7 miles west of the headquarters, on the 24th. Johnson County becomes the fifth county in the southeast part of the state, and the first away from the Mississippi River where EURASIAN TREE SPARROWS are seen regularly. On the 24th, one bird was seen along Winter Eagle Avenue at the southwest corner of the S & G Quarry. In Jefferson County, SHORT-EARED OWLS have been the past two weeks about seven miles northeast of Fairfield, with the latest report from just south of 159th and Quince at dusk on the 20th.

In the southwest in Cass County, two SHORT-EARED OWLS were found at Lake Anita State Park on the 19th.

In the northwest in Sioux County, a MERLIN was at the south edge of Hawarden on the 21rst, and a NORTHERN SHRIKE was along county road K-18 just west of the bridge over the Rock River on the 21rst.
