The week's highlights are WESTERN GREBE in Worth County, Red-necked Grebe in Louisa County, SNOWY EGRET and LITTLE BLUE HERON in Fremont County, and PIPING PLOVER and LEAST TERN in Pottawattamie County. We have had no news this week about the PURPLE GALLINULE in Bremer County, last reported on the 11th.

In the north-central In Worth County, a pair of WESTERN GREBES was on the east end of Rice Lake on the 17th. They were seen by going north from Joice on county road S-10 about two miles, and turning west on 245th Street. Then look to the north when you first see the east end of the lake.

In the southwest in Fremont County, an adult LITTLE BLUE HERON, a SNOWY EGRET, and a CATTLE EGRET were at Secret Lake on the 18th, and five CATTLE EGRETS were there on the 15th. To find Sceret Lake, from its intersection with county road L-44, take J-34 west for about a mile and a quarter, and then go south on a Level B road for about three-quarters of a mile. A LEAST BITTERN was at Forney Lake on the 18th, and a SUMMER TANAGER was at Waubonsie State Park on the 15th. CHUCK-WILLS WIDOWS can be heard at dusk or dawn at their usual location in the Loess Hills. From hiway 2 just west of Waubonsie State Park, turn north on county road L-44. After about a mile and a half, turn right on the first gravel road and listen in the first quarter mile. Although WESTERN KINGBIRDS and BLUE GROSBEAKS can be found many places in the west, a sure location in Fremont County for BLUE GROSBEAK is along the RR tracks south of Bartlett from the bridge to the road to Forney Lake. WESTERN KINGBIRDS are around a house which is found by going east on the first road south of

Bartlett which is Level B, or going east on the second road which is gravel, and then jogging north to the house. In Page County, 15 CATTLE EGRETS were with cows along the east side of hiway 48 bewteen mile markers #4 and #5 southwest of The Markets on the 17th.

In the southeast in Louisa County, on the 14th a RED-NECKED PARTICLES GREBE was on a marshy pond at Flaming Prairie Park, the entrance to which is off of county road X-61 about nine miles south of Muscatine. In Johnson County, two CATTLE EGRETS were just southwest of Swan Lake on the 18th. In Iowa County, we received a second hand report of CHESTNUT-SIDED WARBLERS which were possibly nesting at the Amana Woods. Although very unusual, it is not without precedent, as this species was found in the summer at Holst Forest in Boone County for several years.

In the northwest, a YELLOW-BREASTED CHAT was at the Briar Cliff College Prairie in Sioux City on the 14th.

In the south-central, two UPLAND SANDPIPERS were seen along hiway 34 near the Clarke-Lucas County line on the 19th. In Lucas County, Jim Sinclair discovered a new location for CHUCK-WILLS WIDOW at Stephens State Forest on the 18th. From the junction of hiways 34 and 65. go west about a quarter mile and turn south on gravel. Go to Y in the road and where there is a state forest sign, and the bird was heard along the right fork just beyond the Y. If you follow the left fork to the area of a pond, WHITE-EYED VIREO, BLUE-WINGED WARBLER, VEERY, and NORTHERN PARULA were seen there on the 18th.
