BEFORE I MOVED AWAY FROM COUNCIL BLUFFS IN 1966 I US ED TO HAVE QUITE A FEW TUFTED TITMICE AT MY FEEDERS. NOW I HAVE BEEN BACK MOST OF THREE WINTERS AND HAVE HAD NONE AT MY FEEDERS NOR SEEN OR HEARD ANY DURING THE SUMMER.

PART OF THE REASON I HAVE HAD QUITE A BIT OF SUCCESS ATTRACTING WOOD-PECKERS TO MY BACKYARD, I THINK, ARE THE FEEDERS I USE. I HAVE A LARGE STARLING \mathcal{I} POPULATION IN THIS AREA AND THEY DEPLETE ANY SUET IN A BAG, SO TAKE A LOG, ABOUT 18" LONG AND 3TO 4" IN DIAMETER. I DRILL 4HOLES IN A S TRA IGHT LINE ABOUT 1¹/₂" IN DIAMETER AND A BOUT 2" DEEP. THEN I PUT TWO SCREW EYES ON THE OPPOSITE SIDE OF THE LOG AND HANG IT FROM A LIMB ABOUT 30 DEGREES FROM THE HORIZONTAL. THIS DISCOURAGES THE STARLINGS, BUT DOESN'T BOTHER THE CHICADEES, NUTHATCHES, AND WOODPECKERS. I TAMP THE SUET INTO THE HOLES WITH A SHORT LENGTH OF BROOMSTICK. I HAVE A SUET BOX, WITH PLASTIC "HARDWARE CLOTH" ON THE BOTTOM, BUT I'VE NEVER SEEN A NYTHONG EXCEPT NUTHATCHES AND CHICADEES ON IT.

I HAVE NOT MENTIONED THE YEAR-AROUND BIRDS, SUCH AS HOUSE SPARROWS, STARLINGS, BLUE JAYS, AND CARDINALS. THE BLUE JAY POPULATION SEEMS SMALLER THAN IN OTHER YEARS, BUT THE CARDINAL POPULATION IS GREAT. I HAVE A FEEDER AT MY SON'S HOUSE IN THE CEMETERY AND I COUNTED 15 CARDINALS AT ONCE THERE, (NOT ALL ON THE FEEDER)

I ALSO WANTED TO COMMENT ON THE Y.B. SAPS UCKER I FOUND DEAD. I WONDER IF THE LAST TWO MILD WINTERS MADE HIM DECIDE HE COULD STAY THIS FAR NORTH AND THE JANUARY COLD WAS TOO MUCH FOR HIM THIS YEAR?

FINALLY, I AM INCLUDING A SASE. WILL YOU SEND ME BACK ONE BLANK SHEET FOR FIELD NOTES. I CAN COPY EXTRA'S.
