The week's highlights are RED CROSSBILL at Estherville, PRARIE FALCONS in the central and southwest, and the continued presence of the SNOWY OWL in Scott County, and the VARIED THRUSH near Iowa City.

In the northwest in Emmet County, Verlin Sundee reported on the 27th that a RED CROSSBILL had been at his feeder for a week. You can call Verlin at (712) 362-3612.

In the southwest in Fremont County, Chris Hobbs of the Kansas City Hotline reported seeing a PRARIE FALCON along I-29 at the Percival exit (#13) on the 29th. The bird flew into a tree at the north edge of Percival.

In the central in Grundy County, a PRARIE FALCON was observed 2.2 miles south of the intersection of hiways #14 and #175 on the 26th. In Boone County, Sharon Laub has had two COMMON REDPOLLS at her feeder since the 7th, and 50-200 SNOW BUNTINGS around her farmstead on bad weather days. Sharon lives about four miles east of Rippey, and can be reached at (515)436-7792. In Polk County on the 29th, at least three LONG-EARED OWLS and a SHORT-EARED OWL were roosting in a cedar grove behind the Lincoln Cemetery, which is at the west end of the mile long bridge across the Saylorville Reservoir. A NORTHERN SHRIKE was along 100th Street on the west side of Big Creek State Park, while an adult NORTHERN GOSHAWK was just southwest of the intersection of 100th Street and 150th Avenue on the 30th. In Marion County, a BLACK DUCK was near the iron bridge below the Red Rock Reservoir Dam on the 24th.

In the southeast in Scott County, the SNOWY OWL was still being seen on the 30th. To look for this bird, from the

Walcott exit of I-80 (#284), go south a mile and a quarter, then west on hiway #6 a mile, and then south on gravel 2/3rds of a mile, and look where the railroad tracks cross. In Johnson County, the VARIED THRUSH was still being seen on the 30th in the yard of Jim and Sharon Scheib, 10 Longview Knoll just north of Iowa City. For updates and directions, you can call the Scheibs at (319)337-5206. Elsewhere in Johnson County, the EURASIAN TREE SPARROW is still coming to the feeder at the Wayne Geyer home. The Geyers live on the east side of Black Hawk Avenue, about five miles straight south of the Oxford interchange of I-80 (#230). You can call Mrs. Geyer at (319)628-4274. The NORTHERN SAW-WHET OWL was still being seen on the 30th in a cedar tree along the north side of county road F-20, 0.7 miles west of the Hawkeye Wildlife Area headquarters. The LONG-EARED OWL at the Coralville Reservoir was seen again on the 30th in a cedar grove about a quarter mile southwest of the Greencastle-Swan Lake Road intersection. The adult NORTHERN GOSHAWK was seen again on the 29th at Kent Park, three miles west of Tiffin. Along with a pair of SHARP-SHINNED HAWKS it roosts in a conifer grove at the Evergreen Landing Area there, and is best seen late in the day. On the 27th, a COMMON REDPOLL and a YELLOW-BELLIED SAPSUCKER were at the Birdline's feeders north of Iowa City. In Van Buren County, a RED-SHOULDERED HAWK was seen on the 30th along a gravel road a quarter mile south of county road J-40. The gravel leaves J-40 about five miles west of Keosauqua. At the east edge of Bonaparte, a red-phase EASTERN SCREECH OWL was in a wood duck house on the 30th.

In the west in Ida County, a LONG-EARED OWL was in a conifer grove at Crawford Creek Recreation Area, two miles south of Battle Creek on the 29th, and in Monona County, two dark-phase ROUGH-LEGGED HAWKS were along hiway #175 between Mapleton and Castana on the 29th.

In the north-central, the IOU field trip in Cerro Gordo County on the 30th located a NORTHERN GOSHAWK, two NORTHERN SHRIKES, GRAY PARTRIDGE and a pair of GREAT HORNED OWLS, already on a nest. On the 29th, COMMON REDPOLLS were at a feeder in Rock Falls. For more information on any of these birds, call Curt Nelson at (515)696-5600.
