Some of the new arrivals last week included LARK SPARROW, YELLOW-HEADED BLACKBIRD, BLUE-GRAY GNATCATCHER, BROAD-WINGED HAWK, ORANGE-CROWNED WARBLER, and NORTHERN PARULA. The week's highlights are numerous, with WHOOPING CRANE, EURASIAN COLLARED DOVE, CINNAMON TEAL, RED-NECKED GREBE, and WESTERN GREBE in the central, COMMON BLACK-HEADED GULL, SNOWY EGRET, CINNAMON TEAL, THAYER'S GULL, and RED-NECKED GREBE in the northwest, EVENING GROSBEAK, BEWICK'S WREN, HENSLOW'S SPARROW, and OLDSQUAW in the southwest.

In the central in Madison County, we had an unconfirmed report of five WHOOPING CRANES along the shore of the lake at Badger Creek State Park on the 17th. In Poweshiek County, two EURASIAN COLLARED DOVES were still being seen on the 19th at Grinnell along 16th Avenue at the north edge of the country club golf course. This area is reached from hiway 146 at the north edge of Grinnell by going east on 16th Avenue. In Greene County, a drake CINNAMON TEAL was found at Dunbar Slough on

the 13th. It was on the west side of the main or south entrance road. In Hamilton County, two RED-NECKED GREBES were observed at Little Wall Lake on the 16th and in Polk County, two WESTERN GREBES were seen on the 14th at Big Creek State Park. In Tama County, four GREAT-TAILED GRACKLES were along the east road at Otter Creek Marsh on the 16th.

In the northwest in Dickinson County at Grovers Lake on the Minnesota-lowa

border just east of hiway 86, a COMMON BLACK-HEADED GULL was observed early the morning of the 19th. GREAT-TAILED GRACKLES are also nesting there. From hiway 86 on the border go east on a gravel road 0.4 miles to where the road turns south, and then walk along the fenceline to the lake. In Cherokee County, a SNOWY EGRET was on the Cherokee sewage lagoon and a TRUMPETER SWAN was a flyby there on the 19th. In Palo Alto County, a pair of CINNAMON TEAL was on Virgin Lake on the 18th, and a first year THAYER'S GULL was spotted at Lost Island Lake on the 19th. In Clay
County, all four GOOSE species, including ROSS'S, were seen at Dan Green Slough on the 18th, and a WILLET was at Trumbull Lake on the 19th. In

Winnebago County, RED-NECKED GREBE, EARED GREBE, and nine BLACK-CROWNED NIGHT HERONS were sighted at Myre Slough west of Forest City on the 19th. In Osceola County, the pair of SWAINSON'S HAWKS has returned to a nesting site of many years, three and a half miles south of Allendorf on hiway 59, and then a half mile east on 200th Street.

In the southeast in Jefferson County, Diane Porter of Fairfield was surprised to see a male EVENING GROSBEAK in her yard on the 19th. In Lee County, LOUISIANA WATERTHRUSH and NORTHERN PARULA were back at the Croton unit of Shimek State Forest on the 18th and a BEWICK'S WREN was in a junkyard along the road south of there. To reach these locations, from the 4-way stop in Argyle, go west about two miles, and at the Y, go right and the junkyard is on both sides of the road in less than a mile. Continue north for about a mile and the small parking lot for the Croton unit is found on the right side of the road at the bottom of a hill just before a small bridge. In Van Buren County, at least three HENSLOW'S SPARROWS were in their traditional field southwest of Lacey-Keosaugua State Park on the 18th. To reach this location, go out the south entrance road of Lacey-Keosauqua and keep making right turns until you see a small parking lot on the right side of the road in front of a line of pine trees. The sparrow field is across the road from the parking lot. At Lacey-Keosaugua itself, LOUISIANA WATERTHRUSH and YELLOW-THROATED WARBLER were near the old stone bridge at the entrance to the Ely Ford area. In Muscatine County, an OLDSQUAW in alternate plumage was below Lock & Dam #16 on the Mississippi River at Muscatine on the 18th and 19th. In Louisa County at Cone Marsh, an EARED GREBE was on the pool just north of 220th Street along the south side of the marsh, and five CATTLE EGRETS were along the main dike on the 13th. In Johnson County, YELLOW-THROATED WARBLERS were reported on the 18th from the sycamore trees at the entrance to the Cottage Reserve Area at Lake MacBride State Park, and from Red Bird Farms Natural Area along the Black Diamond Road southwest of Iowa City.

In the northeast in Bremer County, a RED-NECKED GREBE was seen from Martin's Access at Sweet Marsh, and four SANDHILL CRANES were also at Sweet Marsh on the 16th, while in Clayton County, a LOUISIANA WATERTHRUSH was along the stream at Bixby State Park north of Edgewood on the 16th. In Cerro Gordo County, all four GOOSE species, including three ROSS'S, were at Mallard Marsh on the 19th.

In the southwest in Fremont County, a CINNAMON TEAL and 175 GREAT-TAILED GRACKLES were at the Waubonsie Wildlife Area east of Nebraska City, on the 15th. The TEAL was on a pond which is east of the abandoned truck stop along old hiway 2. At Waubonsie State Park, a LOUISIANA WATERTHRUSH was near the bridge on the south side of hiway 2 on the 15th.
