NA: This document is lacking in details! Probably a correct

identification from a good birder.

NA: This documentation is suggestive of Mississippi Kite but is so brief it is also suggestive of a bird not seen in any great detail. The white secondaries are actually the only feature that distinguish the description from any number of other raptors. Sorry, but this identification needs more detail to eliminate confusion with other species.

A-D: Description rather sketchy. The only descriptive details given are pale head, white secondaries, and crow-sized. The white

secondaries are, according to Dunne, diagnostic, however.

A-D: In view of the brevity of this description, this is a difficult record to accept. Even with a fly-by, more detail should have been possible. Were the wings rounded or pointed? Was the tail short or relatively long? However, pale head and white secondaries preclude other raptors.

A-D: Although the documenter did not eliminate other Kites the white upper secondaries does. The details listed are few, but I

think they are diagnostic for adult Mississippi Kite.

NA: Documentation does not give any indication of the coloration of the bird seen, just that it had a pale head and white secondaries that slowly circled and had a broad tail. The description needs to give more in depth study of the tail shape and color and how and why it differs from other kites, as well as Northern Harrier. The description is highly indicative of Mississippi Kite but does not completely try to eliminate some similar species that could be confused with Mississippi Kite. I am not convinced beyond reasonable doubt.

NA: More details are needed! Details and description of body shape, tail color and shape, more body coloration if possible, and other details would have been very helpful. Since a Peregrine Falcon is often confused in size and shape with a Miss. Kite, I don't understand what you mean when you said "wings and tail too broad for one of the larger falcons". This possible Miss. Kite sighting just needed lots more information and details. Also, notes are of greater value if taken immediately after seeing the

bird.
