The week's highlights are the return of the MISSISSIPPI KITES in Polk County, RED-NECKED GREBE and WHITE-WINGED SCOTER in the northwest, and WORM-EATING WARBLER and BEWICK'S WREN in the southeast.

In the northwest in Sac County, two RED-NECKED GREBES, a WHITE-WINGED SCOTER, and two COMMON LOONS were at Blackhawk Lake at Lake View on the 24th. In Osceola County, there is an active SWAINSON'S HAWK nest, which can be found by going south from Allendorf on hiway 59 for three and a half miles, and then east and the south side of the road. In Winnebago County, a MUTE SWAN and a CATTLE EGRET were at Myre Slough, which is about eight miles west of Forest City on the 22nd.

In the central part of the state in Polk County, the MISSISSIPPI KITES have returned to last year's nesting spot at the rear of the Olivet Baptist Church at 73rd and Del Matro in Windsor Heights. This location is reached from I-235 by taking the 8th Street West Des Moines exit, and going north for a little over a mile. They have also been seen periodically flying over Greenwood Park in Des Moines. Another MISSISSIPPI KITE was sighted in Jasper County over the campground at Rock Creek State Park on the 18th. At Brown's Woods, a SUMMER TANAGER was present on the 25th.

In the southeast in Lee County, a WORM-EATING WARBLER was still singing at the

Croton Unit of Shimek State Forest on the 22nd. Other birds seen there included WHITE-EYED VIREO, CERULEAN, BLUE-WINGED, and KENTUCKY WARBLERS, LOUISIANA WATERTHRUSH, and ACADIAN FLYCATCHER. Nearby, a BEWICK'S WREN was seen around outbuildings on the Farrell farm. From the entrance to the Croton Unit, go north on Belfast Road to 150th Street, where you go east to the second house on the left, with the name "Farrell" on the mailbox. At Ft, Madison, a GREAT-TAILED GRACKLE that was mighty far east in the state, was seen on a small marsh just west of the Super 8 Motel on the 22nd. There were also two YELLOW-BREASTED CHAT reports from Lee County. One was on a hillside, which is 3.75 miles upriver along Old Quarry Road from the south end of the bridge over the Skunk River at Augusta on the 25th, and the other was seen on the 26th along Belfast Road where it runs along the Des Moines River between the Croton Unit, and the village of Croton, near a mailbox with the name "Ray Palmer, Jr." on it. In Henry County, a SUMMER TANAGER was spotted at the picnic area at the north end of Geode State Park on the 26th.

In the northeast in Jackson County, several COMMON MOORHENS and a LEAST BITTERN were seen from the large parking lot along the east-west road at Green Island Preserve on the 24th. In Allamakee County, at least three KENTUCKY WARBLERS were singing along trails near the firetower at Yellow River State Forest on the 24th.

In the southwest in Pottawattamie County, birds seen at the MidAmerican Energy Cos. settling ponds south of Council Bluffs on the 25th included LEAST, COMMON, and CASPIAN TERNS, and RUDDY TURNSTONES. At Lake Manawa. there were three adult and two first summer COMMON TERNS.

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
