We have been experiencing problems with the Birdline answering machine, so until repairs can be made, please make reports to my personal phone at (319)338-3561. The LAZULI BUNTING was again reported from Clay County, and other highlights were WESTERN GREBES at three locations, and WHITE-FACED IBIS in the northwest.

In the northwest in Clay County, Lee Schoenewe again heard, but did not see the LAZULI BUNTING on the 9th. He feels this bird may be nesting in the area, possibly with an INDIGO BUNTING female. The location is reached by going south from the town of Dickens on county road M-54 for four and a half miles, and then west on 405th Street to a dead end and parking lot. Then walk south on an old roadbed for nearly a half mile, ford a small stream, and then walk another half mile or so to a culvert, and the bird has been in the vicinity of the culvert and up to a hundred yards north of it. Other probable nesting birds in the area were BROWN CREEPER and BLUE-GRAY GNATCATCHER, both unusualI for that part of the state. Elsewhere in Clay County, three WESTERN GREBES were sighted at Trumbull Lake on the 8th, and at Spencer, Judy Knight reports two RED-BREASTED NUTHATCHES still at her feeder on the 5th. In Clay and Dickinson Counties on the 8th, thirteen duck species were found, including LESSER SCAUP, NORTHERN PINTAIL, RING-NECKED DUCK, REDHEAD, and CANVASBACK. In Dickinson County at DU Marsh, three WHITE-II FACED IBIS were seen on the 3rd.

In the northeast in Black Hawk County, a WESTERN GREBE was near the boat ramp on the lake at George Wyth State Park on the 6th and 7th, In Linn County, a breeding bird survey in the Cedar Rapids area on the 8th found 93 species and a number of non-breeders as highlights, including a WESTERN GREBE at Cedar Lake, and three migrant flycatcher species, OLIVE-SIDED, ALDER, and YELLOW-BELLIED. Breeding birds of particular interest included NORTHERN PARULA and PROTHONOTARY WARBLER. For more information on any of these birds, call Pete Wickham at (319)363-6884.

In the southeast in Johnson County, a PEREGRINE FALCON was a flyover of hiway 218 a mile north of the Hills exit on the 8th.

In the southwest, CHUCK-WILLS-WIDOWS can be heard in the loess hills in Fremont County near Waubonsie State Park. From hiway 2, go north on county road L-44 for a mile and a half, and then go east on the Spring Valley Loop Road, where you listen at dusk and before dawn along the first three-quarters of a mile.
