In the central in Story County, the juvenile YELLOW-BILLED LOON was still being seen at Hallett's Quarry along hiway 69 at the north edge of Ames on the 20th. The quarry was beginning to ice over at that time, but we have had no report either way from the 21st.

In the southwest in Sheby County, the adult male BULLOCK'S ORIOLE continues to be seen eating grape jelly and otherwise loitering around the neighborhood at Elk Horn as of the 21st. It can be seen at Randy and Rhea Leete's house at 2130 Park Street, which is is in the west part of town, one block north of County Road F-58. The Leetes have been very gracious hosts, but will not be available from December 22-26. If you would like to look for the bird at that time contact Woody and Joan Jacobsen, 2126 Park Street, at (712) 764-2132. In Pottawattamie County, eleven TUNDRA SWANS, nine of which were adults, were seen at Lake Manawa SP in Council Bluffs on the 18th.

In the northwest, the Prairie Lake Audubon held their Christmas count on the 18th, and came up with 58 species, including five TUNDRA SWANS that landed on the ice at Center lake.

The week's highlights are the continuation of the YELLOW-BILLED LOON plus an OLDSQUAW in the central, BULLOCK'S ORIOLE in the southwest, the demise of the SNOWY OWL, plus BLACK SCOTER and THAYER'S GULL in the southeast. There are also reports of some of the Christmas Bird Counts this past weekend.

In the central in Story County, the juvenile YELLOW-BILLED LOON continues to be seen through the 19th on the north pond at Hallett's Quarry, which is along hiway 69 at the north edge of Ames. Viewing is from a pullout along hiway 69. There was also an OLDSQUAW on the south pond there on the 17th, and a NORTHERN SHRIKE was still being seen around the south pond on the 18th. In Boone County at the Ledges SP, a SAW WHET OWL was in a cedar grove along the Lost Lake Trail just uphill from a visible wood duck house, a GOLDEN EAGLE was at the mouth of Pease Creek, and a LINCOLN'S SPARROW was on a brushy slope above the canyon road, all on the 13th. On the 18th, a NORTHERN SHRIKE was seen near the DNR nongame HQ near Ledges SP. The Ames Christmas count on the 18th produced a record 65 species, with the star being the YELLOW-BILLED LOON. In Polk County, at the Saylorville Reservoir CBC on the 19th, 80 species were seen with BLACK-CROWNED NIGHT HERON, HERMIT THRUSH, RUBY-CROWNED KINGLET, EVENING GROSBEAK, and NORTHERN SHRIKE.

In the southwest in Shelby County, the adult male BULLOCK'S ORIOLE continues to frequent the yard and feeding area of Randy and Rhea Leete in the town of Elk Horn, through the 19th. This strikingly beautiful bird has evidently been present there since early in November. The Leetes live at 2130 Park Street, which is one block north of County Road F-58 in the west part of town. The Leetes

have been extremely hospitable hosts, but would appreciate a call before coming to see the bird at (712) 764-2932.

In the southeast in Jefferson County, the immature SNOWY OWL which had been seen daily since the 10th along hiway 34 east of Fairfield met its demise, apparently on the 14th in a collision with a vehicle. In Marion County, the Red Rock CBC took place on the 18th, and they listed 79 species, with a THAYER'S GULL below the dam, a female BLACK SCOTER, ROSS'S and GREATER WHITE-FRONTED GOOSE, and COMMON LOON. Also on the 18th was the CBC at Burlington, where a record 85 species was counted, with TUNDRA SWAN (in Illinois), COMMON REDPOLL, and

COMMON YELLOWTHROAT. Iowa City counted on the 19th and had 74 species, the best of which were HERMIT THRUSH, SAW-WHET OWL, VESPER and FOX SPARROWS, NORTHERN SHRIKE, and EASTERN TOWHEE.

In the northeast, the CBC in Cerro Gordo County on the 18th with the North Iowa Bird Club from Mason City found an even 50 species, with 4 NORTHERN SHRIKES, and a very late BLUE-WINGED TEAL. In Linn County, Cedar Rapids had their count on the 18th and saw 72 species, the best of which were BLACK-CROWNED NIGHT HERON, HERMIT THRUSH, both SHRIKE species, PEREGRINE FALCON, and BREWER'S BLACKBIRD.
