\* Eared Grebe -- 6 at Port Neal, on New Lake, Woodbury Co., June 6. None were found there on June 26.

Double-crested Cormorant -- 2 at Louisville Bend (on the Missouri River) June 3; one flying over the Loess Hills Wildlife Area, June 5. Both in M Jonona Co. and three at New Lake, Woodbury Co., June 26.

Com. Pintail-One male at Nashua, Chickasaw Co., June July I.

Canvasback -- One male at New Lake, June 6.

Ring-necked Duck X Lesser Scaup -- One male hybrid at New Lake, June 26. See Documentation.

Greater Scaup--Two (Male & female, pair) at New Lake, June 6. See Doc.

Lesser Scaup-Twelve at New Lake June 6 & 26.

Northern Harrier -- One male at St. Lucas, Fayette co., July 13. Broad-winged Hawk--One at Bank's Tract, Plymouth Co., June II.

Swainson's Hawk -- One with Larry Farmer five miles SE of Westfield,

plymouth Co., June 6; One at St. Lucas June 13.

Turkey -- Is now occurring in fair, but increasing numbers, in the Loess

Hills as far north as Monona Co ..

Piping Plover -- A pair found by Larry Farmer on June 4 were seen by me j June 5 at Louisville Bend, Monona Co..

Fayette Co. from July I2 to the 20. One in Chickasaw Co., June 22.

Lesser Yellowlegs -- Ten at Nashua, July I. Solitary Sandpiper - One at St. Lucas July 8. Pectoral Sandpiper - One at Nashua, July I.

Ring-billed Gull--One at Nashua, July I.

Common Tern--Three at Decatur Bend of the Missouri River June "2. 556tle Tern--

Little Tern--A pair was seen at Louisville Bend June 3-6. One was also

fond on a farm pond two miles s of Plymouth Co. June 24. See doc.

Ruby-throated Hummingbird -- Three at Bank8s Tract June 7. Alder Flycatcher--Nine were heard in Harrison Co. June I; 3 in Loess Hills Wildlife Area, Monona Co., June 2.; I4 were counted in Monona Co., June 3 (I2 of them at Decatur Bend); 2 at Loess Hills Wildlife Area June 4; 2, at the Bank's Tract June 7; One at the Bank's on June 8.

Olive-sided Flycatcher -- Found singles in Monona Co. June 3 & 5.

N. Mockingbird -- One in Plymouth Co. six miles se of Westfield Jane 25

Cedar Waxwing -- 75 were at the Bank's Tract June 8; one was observed buil-

ding a nest at West Union, Fayette Co., \$ hine July 8. Loggerhead Shrike -- Two pairs were observed in Plymouth Co. in June.

Blk.-and-white Warbler-Singing males were observed at Little Sioux Boys Scout Camp in Monona Co, June 3 and at the Bank's Tract June 23. Prothonotary Warbler -- Singing male at Little Sioux Boys ScoutCamp, June 4.

Tennesse Warbler -- One singing n . of Missouri Valley, Harrison Co.,

June I. Blackpoll Warbler -- One at the Bank's Tract, Plymouth Co., June 7.

Kentucky Warbler -- One at Bank's Tract, June 8. Mourning Warbler -- One at Boy Scout Camp June 3. Canada Warbler -- One , Bank's Tract June 8.

Present all summer at Forney Lake, but no breeding evidence. Eared Grebe: 18 on June 11, 8 June 19; still present late July (fide Tanya Bray).

Three at Forney June 19. Brown plumes could be seen. Cattle Egret:

Green-winged Teal: Three loafing males at Riverton June 11 strongly suggests incubating females.

Blue-winged Teal: 20 males at Forney and Riverton June 11 also suggests incubating females.

One male at Forney June 11. + Redhead:

Ruddy Duck: One male and three females at Forney June 11.
Upland Sandpiper: Individuals seen June 19, July 27, both Fremont County. Also Pottawattamie County on BBS route June 4.

Spotted Sandpiper: One at Riverton, June 11, where it usually breeds.

Long-billed Dowitcher: One at Riverton (all alone) June 11. Field notes state: Breeding plumage; spots sides of neck, spots and barring on flanks, reddish to undertail coverts. Call weak "keek" when flushed (seen with Carl Bendorf).

Semipalmated Sandpiper: One in a wet spot on the Missouri bottoms (a corn field). also alone. June 19, seen with Bob Myers. Field notes state: Black legs,; bill black, short, stout, straight. Upperparts dark grayish, eyeline noticeable. Breast lightly but noticeably streaked. Throat white, belly and undertail area white. Small size: about same as Am. Goldfinch standing nearby. No trace of rufous (cap dark gray). Feathers of back lightly edged paler off-white. Apparently adult in breeding plumage.

Eight at Riverton June 11. ▶Black Tern:

Chuck-will's-widow: Five at usual spot June 10.

Acadian Flycatcher: One very territorial at Waubonsie SP June 17. Sporadic here.

Willow Flycatcher: Common at Riverton and Forney in June. A good field-mark is the virtual lack of an eyering (see Roberson).

Blue-gray Gnatcatcher: One in the picnic area at Waubonsie seen twice in June. Also sporadic here.

Loggerhead Shrike: Easy to find this summer in northern Fremont County.

Prothonotary Warbler: Two singing males at Riverton June 11.

Summer Tanager: Could not be located at usual spot in Waubonsie June 11. However a silent male found with Bob Myers June 19. Francis Moore may have found the reason this species is getting tougher to find: a female feeding a single cowbird chick late in June.
