

Marbled Godwit - 1

April 24, 1984

NE Mills County, Iowa (Former Tom Axtell farm, recently purchased ~~by~~ ^{by} a Stortenbecker)

Description of flying shorebird: "Flying. Large. Long beak. Unmarked wing. Bill prob. straight. Buff below + most of elsewhere too. Outer primaries darker. I don't see white on rump or anywhere else. Bill long for sure."

Behavior + description of the sighting: the stortenbecker's have pushed up a new terrace below the top of the hill. I was walking by on the road below when about 30 starlings flushed, along with what I thought were 3 Rock Doves, 1 of them brown. The two real ones went north, + the brown one circled back + was clearly a shorebird. Wing pattern immediately reminded me of the long-billed Curlew one we have at UNO - Some worn brown, some black outer primaries. Bird circled a few times, moving west, + finally flew south behind mass timber. Soil was bare behind + near terrace.

Similar species: Other large shorebirds

Hudsonian Godwit: White wing stripe + in rump

Dowitchers: white rump + back

Long-billed Curlew: Similar. I think the bill was straight, but am eliminating this mainly by probability.

Viewing condition: About 7:30 am. Saw it a minute

or so. 8x binoculars. I can show you the distance, but can't measure it off a map, as the ~~the~~ terrace is never than the maps we have. The whole property isn't wider than a $\frac{1}{4}$ $\frac{1}{4}$ section, & the bird wasn't at the far side if it at first. The bird was nearly due west of me. My weather notes for this census say "sunny, few fluffy clouds $\frac{1}{3}$, light breeze from NW".
