Medium sized shorebird, body size appeared slightly smaller than Killdeer, larger than Least Sandpiper (direct comparison for both) Legs fairly long but not the extreme length of a yellowlegs, legs were yellowish in color Bill fairly long and slightly decurved. Bill appeared somewhat blunt at end rather than needle shape of a yellowlegs, also appeared thicker than a yellowlegs bill Body-didn't pay a lot of attention but basically dark above, light below with some dark markings on front of neck and chest. Head-top of head dark, also faint dark line through eye with distinct light line above the eye. In good light, could see faint hint of remnants of reddish cheek patch on side of head. Behavior-feeding with distinctive sewing machine like behavior (bill down into water and mud and then repeatedly plunged down several times without bill leaving the water. Saw this several times. Bird didn't fly so didn't see wing or tail markings.

Similar species and how eliminated: Lesser Yellowlegs-bill shape, thickness, leg length, head markings. Solitary Sandpiper-eye line rather than eye ring

Did any one disagree or have reservations about identification? ? If yes, explain: once I had good lighting, no doubts Viewing conditions: lighting, distance (how measured), and optical equipment: lighting poor in morning, returned in evening when had light behind me and could see colors better. Bird was about 50 yards away. Looked at with 20x spotting scope. Previous experience with this species and similar ones: Have seen this species numerous times
