Bob Cecil and I were checking the gulls at the lock and dam in Keokuk when we noticed two of the birds had very light translucent primaries. The two birds overall were a a very light tan to cream color. There was no darkness at all in the primaries. There was not a descernable tail band. The eye was dark. The legs were a very light pink color. The bill was bicolored, the front 15 to 14 was blackish with the rest being a light pink color about the same color or a little darker than the legs. The bill on both birds was very large and massive looking. The two birds were larger than the Herring Gulls near-by and much larger than the one or two Ring-billed Gulls seen close to them, completely dwarking them in flight. Their flight was somewhat labored compared to the Herring Gulls flight. No voice was heard. Similar species and how eliminated: No other large gull has a pink bill with a black tip like these birds did. Did any one disagree or have reservations about identification? No If yes, explain: Viewing conditions: give lighting, distance (how measured), and optical equipment: Very good to excellent viewing conditions, partly cloudy. Seen from approx. 75 yards at closest using 10 x 40 Leitz binoculars and Celestron ago telescope at 33 x and 55 x.
