I noticed a small group of Scaup that stayed a ways from the other scaup and Ring-necked Ducks, There were a lot of both Lesser Scaup and Ring-necked Ducks near-by. The 7 ducks in the small group appeared a little larger with a more robust look to them. Looking at them through the telescope the head appeared to have a greenish look to it on the male birds. The head on all 7 birds looked like it was flat headed compared to the Lesser Scarp nearby. One of the female birds had a lighter head than the other 3 females and had a whitish area behind the eye (auricular patch). No voice was heard.

Similar species and how eliminated: Lesser Seaup does not have this flat headed look
as this bird had, but a pointed head look. Lesser Scamp female does not have a whitish area behind its eye like one of these birds had. The bill was not bonded as a Ring-necks
area behind its, eye like one of these birds had. The bill was not bonded as a King-necks
Duck female woold have been.
