DESCRIPTION OF BIRD: This bird was flying overhead and away from the viewers. You could plainly tell it was a Mississippi Kite from the flight silhouette with its long pointed wings and long, slim body and tail. The color distinction from the dark outer primaries to the lighter secondaries was very evident. The color of the body on top of the bird was a blend of the other two colors. The underneath pattern of the bird was highlighted by the darker black primaries shading to a dark grey all underneath the bird, except for the very black tail.
