Description of size, shape and color-pattern (describe in great detail all parts of the plumage, and beak and feet coloration, in addition, to the diagnostic characteristics, but include only what actually was seen in the field): Bird was Great Horned Owl size & shape, but white, looking at first glance like a Snowy Owl (only in wrong habitat.) However this owl had dark "horns", pale gray facial discs, black bill and very white breast & white feathered legs & feet, Its back was lightly barred, giving it a grayish look, the gray extending to the crown & forehead. In flight, faint beige barring under the wings showed, & the barring on back was more visible.
7. Description of voice, if heard: not heard Alert and watchful, occasionally flushing to 8. Description of behavior: another spot in grove, talso to grove at next farm 9. Habitat - general: open farmland usually calm, allowing us good observing. specific: deciduous grove around farm stead
10. Similarly appearing species which are eliminated by questions 6, 7 & 8. Explain: Snowyowl - thisowl had ear tuffs & facial discs making it a Great Buy
11. Distance (how measured)? 100' 275', 400' - 12. Optical equipment: Binoculars measured by distance-finder on camera & Scope
13. Light (sky, light on bird, position of sun in relation to bird and you): mostly clear bit of haze, sun behind us as we observed owl
