Habitat: Near lakeshore of large manmade lake in mixed hardwood forest, agricultural cropland. Wet

mudflat in deep ditch (outflow channel from small pond along entrance road to parking lot).

Description:

Size: Similar to Spotted Sandpiper, smaller than Solitary Sandpiper (all three species were foraging in the same area).

Shape: Appeared longer and thinner than Spotted Sandpiper, posture less erect. Wing-tips extended well beyond tip of tail on standing bird. Appeared very long winged in flight.

Bill: Black, moderately long, very slightly down-turned at tip, diffuse yellowish area at base of lower mandible.

Eyes: Dark brownish black.

Head: Streaked dark brown on pale brown with buff to pale rufous crown and auriculars (crown darkest), distinct narrow white supercilium extending to just beyond auriculars, lores dark brown.

Throat: Chin and throat unmarked white.

Back: Feathers blackish brown with buff to gray edges, scapulars with strong pale rufous edges.

Rump: Feathers blackish brown with buff to gray edges.

Breast/Belly: White with distinct blackish brown streaks (spots) from lower neck across breast to upper belly and extending along flanks.

Wings: Dorsal: Primaries and secondaries dark blackish brown, tertials blackish brown with indistinct lighter edges, all coverts paler brown than flight feathers and with grayish edges. Very narrow gray-white wingbar from tertials to inner 1 or 2 primaries (fringe of greater coverts). Ventral: Grayish white, no details noted.

Tail: Dorsal: dark blackish brown, uppertail coverts unmarked white. Ventral: not noted.

Legs/Feet: Black. Vocalizations: None.

Behavior: Foraging on mudflat. When deliberately flushed it flew about 20 yards and resumed foraging. **Similar species and how eliminated:** Other Calidris sp. except Baird's eliminated by amount of primary extension beyond tail on standing bird. Eliminate Baird's Sandpiper by white uppertail coverts.

Did anyone disagree or have reservations about identification: No.

Viewing conditions: Cloud cover not noted, approx. 40 yards(estimate), Leupold 12-40x60@40.

Previous experience with species and similar ones: Numerous sightings; however, I initially reported this bird to the IA RBA as an immature. I had not looked in any references and the bright colors on the crown, auriculars and scapular fringes fooled me. Later, after consulting Hayman's Shorebirds, I realized my mistake. Sorry!!

References consulted before writing description: Hayman (see above).
