A large brownish hawk came flying in over the south side of the marsh and landed ona
broken off tree stump approx. 6 to 10 feet tall. The bird was the size of a Red-tailed Hawk
but slightly slimmer with a longer tail and shorter wings, rounderwings, The bird
was probably a female because of its size. It was Lark brown above witha
long dark brown banded tail (approx. 4 lighter bands). The bird had dark brown
streaking on the breast and head. There was a broad white eyebrow stripe above the eye. The bill was blackish with a yellow cere and the feet were yellow.
As it flew up to the stomp It had a continuous flapping type of flight but
as it flow away from the stump approx. 5 min. later it had a more accipiter flap, flap, flap, soor type of flight. No voice was heard.
Similar anaiga, hay aliminated.
Similar species; how eliminated: Lavge Size eliminates sharp-shinned and Cooper's Hawks and Merlin.
The broad white eyestripe eliminates all others.
Did any one disagree or have reservations about the identification? No.
Viewing conditions: give lighting, distance (how measured), optical equipment.
partly cloudy with good light, from approx. 100 yds using 10x40 binoculars and 20x telescope.
Previous experience with species and similar ones: Have seen lots of sharp-shinned Howks, Cooper's Hawks, Northern Goshawks and Merlins.
