We were walking on the dike heading toward the parking lot when we noticed a rail walking 70-80' ahead of us in the path on top of the dike. We had been Flushing many Virginia Rails and Soras just a short time before and realized at once this was twice as big as a Virginia Rail. We had very good looks at this cooperative bird. It had no gray eye patch like a Virginia Rail but was all brown in the face. It also had a dark bill unlike the reddish bills of Virginia Rails we had been seeing. It walked along the dike in front of us for about 5 minutes as we were getting claser. Then it ducked into the grasses on the side. We flushed it from the grasses from about 25-30' away. Then we flushed another smaller Virginia Rail just right after seeing the King Rail fly.

Similar species and how eliminated: Virgina Rail is much smaller than this rail. The King Rail was the size of a small hen. The King Rail had brownish cheeks and a dark bill unlike the Virginia Rail's grayish cheeks and reddish bill. Did any one disagree or have reservations about identification? No
