At 4100 PM a large falcon came soaring fast & without a wingbeat south into the strong ESE winds, & was gone. It was at tree top height on this bluff, about 20 feet high & 25 yards east of as with long tapered wings, charcoal-gray back, black helmet (crown, nape & malar stripe), lighter underneath. This was much lighter than the other one with a light gray-brown back, light brown head, but with a distinct falcon, was crow-sized, going very fast through the opening.
