ON Highway 22 about $\frac{1}{4}$ mile west of the Cedar River Bridge there is a smaller bridge over a stream. While approaching this bridge from the west I saw a falcon-shaped bird circling around over it. I stopped the car at the bridge and got out. The bird was still flying around overhead and I got my glasses, (8x40). Assuming it was a falcon I looked for black 'mustache' marks and saw them. The bird was bluish gray dorsally, a dark bluish gray. The 'cap' of the head and mustaches appeared black. Underneath, throat and extreme upperbreast white, lowerbreast & belly were horizontally and thickly barred with grayish alternating with white. The wings were long and pointed pale ^{below} and dark above. The tail was dark above and pale below, long, fairly thin and slightly fanned, bordered at the end with whitish. These characteristics lead me to believe that this was a perigrine falcon, another raptor. It flew in a falcon manner, ~~but~~ Its smallish size makes me think it was a male. It was a little larger than a red dove but with longer & pointier wings & tail. Smaller than a crow. I observed it in good light for about 45 seconds to one minute, then it quickly flew north up the stream.
