head-dark on top with black marks coming down behind the eyes
belly + breast- from our distance, it appeared to be a pale white or
light brown color.  legs teet, - legs were stretched out at 90° from birds body after one of its dives. The toes on the foot were all splayed out to catch a bird which it missed, we got no color on legs or teet. The behavior - the bird was flying north into a head wind of about 30 mph, we did notice the rowing of the wings in flight. The bird also dove we did notice the rowing of the wings in flight.
