The immature kittiwake was with other gulls floating on the water. It was larger than Bonaparte's Gulls and smaller than Ring-Billed Gulls. It had a small black bill, dark legs observed in flight, and a large black smudge almost that was quite wide on its nape. It had a white tail with a black terminal tail band. It had a rounded white head with a large black spot behind its eye. It had black showing on the edges of the wings as it swam, I saw it fly some and the black "Cross arms" (or the dark bars across the inner wings) were very noticeable on its white and grayish wings. It was a very noticeable gull from the others with its black nape and black on the wings.

Similar species and how eliminated: A Bonaparte's Full lacks the black bar on its nape and does not have as much black in its wings.
