Head, neck, and underparts white; head and neck flecked with brownish streaking - which did not obscure the basic white color of these parts. Bill relatively large, with downward hook, yellow, with bright red spot on lower mandible. Legs yellowish. Mantle a dark charcoal gray. Wing primaries black with some white spots in them. Size - close to that of Herring Gulls on sandbar - significantly bigger than Ring-bills also on sandbar, and stood higher than them. The bird was standing on a sandbar with about 170 other gulls. It also walked around, and seemed pretty aggressive, at one point going after a fish another gull Similar species; how eliminated:

The dark mantle, yet whitest head, neck, and underparts identified it as an adult gull, and immediately eliminated Herring, Ring-billed and other gray or whitish-backed guils. It was too small for Great Black-backed Gull, which has flesh-colored legs any way, or slaty-backed Gull, which has pinkish legs. The mantle was not tronly black, as a Great Black-backed Gull, Did any one disagree or have reservations about the identification? \_\_\_\_\_ maintle would be. If yes, explain: \_
