When it flew it appeared an all dark bird. Just as it landed on the water silvery-white was showing near the tail area, no doubt the tips of its underwings, Unfortunately our time was almost up on our permit, we couldn't find the Black Scoter female again. Similar species and how eliminated: Ruddy Duck - this bird was much larger than Ruddies close by, bill was different, no pointed fail as Ruddies have - also this bird had light cheeks, extending further than Ruddies Did any one disagree or have reservations about identification? No If yes, explain: Viewing conditions: give lighting, distance (how measured), and optical equipment: Cloudy, 40 yards closest to 100 yards, estimate, binoculars and scope Previous experience with species and similar ones: Never a Black Scoter, but both Mark + Jim have seen them.
