Birds seen were very large, eagle size birds. The immature bird had some white showing near the base of the primaries on the under wing sorface. Not nearly as much as the immature Bald Eagles seen in the same general vacinity before and after this bird. This immature Golden Eagle also had a wide band of white on the opper part of its tail with a broad dark brown terminal band. The bird was an overall dark brown on the belly, head, neck and opper and lower wings. The neck had an area of lighter or more golden brown on it on the opper beck. The adult bird seen a few minutes after the state immature had the same general coloration withe the exceptions the the tail contained no white in it and there was no white in the wings at the base of the primaries. The adult bird did have the golden colored feathers at the back of the neck as the immeture bird did. Noithe bird had a particularly massive looking bill as an immature Bald Eagle would seen to have.

Similar species and how eliminated: Immature Bald Eagle has a more massive looking bill and are more wolled with white or light colored areas on the opper and lower surfaces of the wings. These birds did not have this characteristic. Did any one disagree or have reservations about identification? No

Viewing conditions: give lighting, distance (how measured), and optical equipment: Viewing conditions were bright overcost to sunny. Birds viewed from approx. 150 to 200 yards at closest with 7+35 mm B+L Roof Prism binoculars and 20 x 60 Bushnell Spacemester telescope mounted on a gun-stock type mount. Previous experience with species and similar ones: Have seen Golden Eagles in N.E. Iowa for last coople of years and have lots of experience with immature Bald Eagles.
