Description of bird: The chunky body, short legs and neck, and short tail, which it constantly flicked, identified the bird as a rail. As I watched the bird walking along the edge of the marsh, I noted the following marks; the bird was quite large(almost as big as a coot), back was brown, throat and breast were a light rusty color, flanks and undertail coverts were barred black-and-white, and the bill was at least as long as the head and very slightly decurved

Similar species and how eliminated: The large size and large bill eliminate Virginia Rail. The rusty(not grayish) underparts eliminate the very similar Clapper Rail(!!).

Viewing conditions and equipment: Viewing conditions were o.k.—the bird was seen during a light drizzle on an overcast day. Estimated viewing distance was 20 ft at the closest. I used Nikon 8 x 23 binoculars.

Previous experience with species: I have seen several King Rails in Iowa.
