Breast, flanks, back--females--dark brown, slightly darker on back than sides: male--uniform black. Tail--dark brown or black; wedge-shaped and sometimes elevated in the manner of Ruddy Duck. Eye--brown. Feet and legs--black. Wings--underwing 2-toned, black linings and silvery flight feathers; upperwings uniform dark brown or black. Kept in a compact group, did some diving.

Female Surf & White-wigged usually have two distinct white spots on cheeks; dark throat and chin.

Similar species and how eliminated: Ruddy Duck (winter male & female)--smaller, bill flatter and lighter colored, breast and flanks whiter, overall lighter colored. Other scoters--flatter head profile; heavier, lighter colored bill; lighter colored legs; White-winged has white speculum; Did any one disagree or have reservations about identification? No
