Large dark colored duck swimming alone several hundred yards away. No other birds for comparison.

Body very dark; generally the head, neck and chest were black, rest of body was dark brown. Distinct white patch around eye immediately obvious. Couldn't see eye itself to see location of patch relative to eye but patch obvious and matched crescent shape shown in field guides for breeding plumaged male. Bill dark at base and distal half orange-red. When bird stretched, could see that legs and feet were also orange red. When it stretched wing several times, could see large distinct white wing patch. Bird eventually flew and wing patch obvious in flight.

Similar species and how eliminated: Size and color immediately pointed toward a scoter. Eye patch immediately identified it as White-winged, further cooroborated when white wing patch seen.

Did any one disagree or have reservations about identification? no

Viewing conditions: lighting, distance (how measured), and optical equipment: 20 power scope, bird several hundred meters away. Sun behind me and good lighting.

Previous experience with this species and similar ones:
Have seen several in Iowa and a number in Alaska. Don't recall seeing one with white eye marking previously.

Looked at Robbins field guide while viewing bird and Nat. Geographic guide next day.
