Viewing conditions: give lighting, distance (how measured), and optical equipment:

Lighting was excellent - Clear, sunny day with sun behind us. Bird was flushed at an estimated distance of 20°. The bird then flew several hundred yards (est.) in plain view before it disappeared in a grove of trees. Used 7x35 Baish tlongly binoculars. The bird was seen sitting at 20 birefly before flushed.
