While jogging on a trail near the Skunk River I trist saw the hawk as it glided down across the trail in front of me (about 20 feet away). The first features observed were a hawk-life bill and a distinct, dark band across the eye with a light colored head. I didn't have a chance to see the color of underside. As the hawk flew away into open forest habitat I saw the dark blue-gray coloring over the back, wings and tail. I saw no distinct banding on the tail, except for a faint buffy edge. The wing spread was between 3 and 4 feet. The entire observation lasted less than 10 seconds. Although I didn't see it until it right in front of me, I assumed that if was perched in a dead tree about in feet from the trail, and that my approach flushed the bird into the open area over the trail. The bird made no vocalizations.
