Five of the scaup on the lake looked larger than normal scaup that I usually see. The two Males looked whiter than normal on the back and wings. The heads did not look pointed but looked more rounded and had a fatter headed, larger headed look than a Lesser Scaup. Two of the females had white circular patches behind the eye which Lesser Scaup do not have. The birds never flew while being viewed. I could not make any color out on the head of the males. With the combination of the above I concluded they were Greater Scaup.

Similar species and how eliminated: Female Lesser Scaup do not have white "ear patch" as these females did. All five birds had a somewhat larger headed looks with the head looking "fat" and rounded not pointed as Lesser Scaup would have appeared.
