SCISSOR TAILED FLYCATCHER

July 21, 1984 3 p.m.

Lewis and Clark State Park Monona County, Iowa

Description:

One bird; an immature. Head, cheeks, back and throat light gray. Black lores. Bill was black straight, and fairly heavy for the flycatcher family. Belly and undertail coverts were offwhite or very pale gray. Wings were charcoal-gray. They had pale edgings which suggested very faint narrow wing bars. The tail was long and slender, but only about 2/3 the length of an adult. No pink coloration was seen either when the bird was sitting or flying.

Behavior:

Perched on wires. After observing him for some minutes, I walked closer, flushing him and observed the "scissor" action of the tail when the bird was in flight.

Habitat:

Utility wires over croplands. This is bottomland between the two arm of Blue Lake. East Blue Lake is bordered by Lewis & Clark State Park. West Blue Lake is almost totally marsh(cattails) and is bordered by croplands.
