Also mention voice and behavior. My first view was af whost I believed a Red Phalargpe switching in shallow water on far side of marshwith ducks t yellowlegs. I hiked down from other side for a close view t sporked hundreds af ducks a a few geese off the marsh. Swearing to my self, I sparched for the bird. Soon a flock of yellowlegs settled in a puddle only 20.30yds from me. One of them was different!  Approx. He same size as adjacent L. tellowlegs, the bird was plain pale gray on the crown, hindred, back, and wings. It was clear white on the face and winder parts. It had a pale gray line from the eye backwird, in joining with the hindred, a "phalarope mark" but not rearly as dark as on a Red medial or feed). The legs were almost as yellow as the yellowlegs'. The bill was black, not belief and small headed compared to yellowlegs. It fed with a frontte herby. Similar species: how eliminated: jerky actron when on land or wedning in shellow mater.  It had a white rumpe when it flew in to land.
