13. (58). Larus atricilla Linn. Laughing Gull.

Anderson 1907 p 155 This gull is a southern species, rarely found as far north as Iowa, in the interior. Thomas Say (Long's Exp., i, pp. 266-70), notes "Larus ridibundus. Large flocks flying northward May 20, 1820." (Engineers' Cantonment). The species has been reported from Omaha by L. Skow (Rev. Bds. Neb., 20). Dr. Trostler reported the Laughing Gull as a "scarce migrant in Pottawattamie and Mills counties. I have seen them frequently at Big Lake and Manawa Lake (Pottawattamie), and along the river in Mills county. One killed Oct. 10, 1894, at Blencoe, Iowa, by H. W. Kerr (reported to me by J. A. Dickinson, of Gresham, Neb.)."
