Chukars in the Quad-Cities — Throughout the 1970s, I received several reports of Chukars at feeding stations and in yards in Davenport and Bettendorf. In 1974 a bird built a nest in a railroad yard in west Davenport but did not succeed in hatching her eggs. Several years ago I received a call to identify a bird in the yard of Richard Knox who lives about four blocks from me just into Bettendorf. The bird was a Chukar and upon learning its identity, Mr. Knox recalled that he bought 100 in Oklahoma in 1970 and released them in his yard (several acres, partly wooded). These birds apparently spread throughout the area and were responsible for the many reports. At a n.w. Davenport resident indicates they have bred successfully the last three summers. One report in the summer of 1981 came from near Blue Grass, nearly fourteen miles from the release point.
