CLASSIFICATION OF RECORD:

COMMENTS: The committee regretfully classed this record as a IV, based mostly of the difficulty of rendering bird voices sufficiently unambiguously, and on the lack of previous experience of both observer and committee with the vocalizations of this little-known species.

The opinions expressed here are based on the information available to the Committee and should not necessarily preclude an alternate interpretation by those who observed the bird firsthand.

Any action may be re-reviewed upon submission of additional evidence.

Explanation of Classification:

I = labeled, diagnostic specimen, photograph, or recording available for review by the Committee

II = acceptable sight record documented independently by 3 or more observers

III = acceptable sight record documented by 1 or 2 observers

IV = probably correct record, but not beyond doubt V = record with insufficient evidence to judge

VI = probably incorrect identification, escapee, or otherwise unacceptable record

Classification is based on the highest category agreed upon by six of seven committee members.

Thursday May 6 about 6:30 - 7:00 am I was observing sora and Virginia Tails when I decided to try a Black Rail tape. I repeated the taped cull a number of times at varied length, shut off the tape, rewind, and start again. At one point I shut off the tape and Twile heard the end call of the Black Rail call - the down slurred "doo". Not really expecting a Black Rail my first reaction was to check and see if the tape was still playing. It was not. I looked for sometime but had no luck in locating the bird. There was no further response to the tapes.

I mentioned this incident to James Huntinton later in the day and said I might be interested in attempting to get a response to the tapes that night. Around lopm James called back and said a Black Rail had been seen sometime earlier at sycamore slough by Jim Fuller. Within 20 minutes James, John Cordell and I were at the slough.

Using the same technique as Earlier in the day (two of three colls and then a pause) we started our quest. During the 50 minutes we were there we heard Sora, Virginia Rails, Lesser Yellowlegs, Blue-winged teal and much to our satisfaction two seperate calls from a Black Rail. They were heard approximately 15 minutes apart from different locations. The call, hihi doo, Though not loud was quit distinct and simultainially recognized. There were other responses to the tape but they were heard by only one of us or they were attributed to whatever else was around. I would say the bird responded but never approached our location.

Whilt playing the tapes I Thought an echo may bounce back and misted us but I made some check and eliminated that possibility.

As far as I know Jim Fuller was not aware of my morning Trip to sycamore Flough. I am submitting This in support of his sighting. This was written may 7 1982
