VOTE: 4-III, 2-IV, 1-V

IV, Probably was Prairie Falcon but not enough detail to rule out Peregrine. Assume it wasn't Harrier although rump not mentioned.

III, I am disturbed that black axillaries were not seen. Light color, date, and location may be enough to accept this record. Enough to call the bird a falcon.

V, Were "vertical darker brown feathers" axillaries?

IV, Probably correct but contrasting axillaries were not noted to further rule out imm. peregrine.

III, Prairie is more likely than Peregrine immature in March. Light brown back would indicate Prairie. Narrow mustache is a good mark (though not 100%). Too large for Merlin. Too small for Gyrfalcon.

III, Convincing--date and location good. Axillars not seen, but coloration well seen. Perhaps not diagnostic for Prairie, but satisfactorily eliminates other possibilities.

III, OK? Shape. No view of dark axillars. Distance not too bad.

COMMENTS: The main concern of the Committee was that the

axillars were not seen (or described), and so the documentation could not be considered diagnostic. There was also not enough additional information given to rule out other possibilities such as Northern Harrier, Merlin, or immature Peregrine. These are rather remote possibilities, admittedly, but please see the first note below.

The opinions expressed here are based on the information available to the Committee and should not necessarily preclude an alternate interpretation by those who observed the bird firsthand.

Any action may be re-reviewed upon submission of additional evidence.

Explanation of Classification:

- I: labeled, diagnostic specimen, photograph, or recording available for review by the Committee
- II: acceptable sight record documented independently by 3 pr more observers

III: acceptable sight record documented by 1 or 2 observers

- IV: probably correct record, but not beyond doubt
- V: record with insufficient evidence to judge
- VI: probably incorrect identification, escapee, or otherwise unacceptable record.

Classification is based on the highest category agreed upon by six of seven Committee members.
