A-D, I have seen Rough-legged Hawk in early June in Pocahontas Co.

A-D, Late record but considering the strange spring, probably not that outrageous.

A-D, I have been fooled by immature Swainson's Hawk at this time of year. Wing-tail lengths unclear from documentation. If the wing projected beyond the tail, that would favor Swainson's. Also, Swainson's immatures tend to be on the ground and tame -- I walked up to one in North Dakota. The head color, belly band, and large amount of white at the base of tail seem to be diagnostic, but the overall description is sketchy considering that the bird was present on two days and could have been flushed. Other details, such as cere color, more detail on head markings, and lack of bands in the tail would have been helpful. Apparently there were other late rough-legs in the Midwest this spring (fide Ken Brock).

A-D, Although late, features seen confirm ID as this species. Not unprecedented in late May, even though a new late record for Iowa.

I spotted this hawk on the way home from work, told nom, and we returned on May 30. It was a light-phase Roughter. It was perched near a form field pond on the ground. It was a big hawk and quite contented on the ground. Diving Red-winged Blackbirds did not bother it at all. It had a creamy-colored head and throat that was light yellowish in color. It was dark brown on its back with some splotchiness. Its creamy-colored head and upper breast had brownish streaks throughout. It had a heavy dark brownish breast band-look and (brownish on belly, I believe). It shock itself a few times and showed its tail. The top side of the tail had a very wide dark terminal tail band (about 1/2 of its tail) and large white base of its tail. It showed a long tail and wing look projecting behind it as it was perched in the field. It was wonderful! A very late record! Similar species and how eliminated: where did it come from and where was it going ?? I can't think of other buteos it could be with its tail pattern, head coloration, and broad dark band across belly. Did any one disagree or have reservations about identification? NO we would have liked to see it fly but it was content If yes, explain: on ground. Absolutely certain it was a Rough-legged Hank Viewing conditions: give lighting, distance (how measured), and optical equipment: Sunny both days and good viewing. 100 yards and 20 yards estimate.
