## DOCUMENTATION OF RARE BIRD

## SPECIES: BOHEMIAN WAXWING

LOCATION: Grinnell (Poweshiek County) Grinnell Country Club golf course in a deciduous tree about 120 feet east of the clubhouse parking lot.

DATE and TIME: 6 January, 1999 (Approximately 12N)

DESCRIPTION: We spotted a flock of about 15 Waxwings in a bare tree on the country club golf course about 120 feet east of the clubhouse parking lot. After getting binoculars on the birds, almost immediately Tom said there was a larger gray appearing waxwing with the Cedar Waxwings. I got on the bird almost immediately, and it was the most right hand bird in the flock. This bird, compared to the Cedar Waxwings was slightly but noticably larger, generally grayer, and presented obvious rusty coloration in the undertail area. I only spent about ten seconds looking at these birds, and then started setting up the window mount telescope when they flew away as a group.
