COMMENTS:

the Committee felt that the description was not sufficiently detailed to rule out similar species such as vesper sparrow.

The April 9 record was classified as a Class III record, an accepted sight record.

Time April 6, 1982 about 4.80 PM Place Five miles SISW of Nichds Ioua in Pike Township weather clear, calm, about 30°F

V Al Hahn & I were looking for Smiths Longiques and found about sixteen. We flushed them off a gravel road into com stylle while driving we Stopped and they returned to the road. We observed then from ter to fifteen yards away. They had an overall buffy coloration, danker dove. They were streaked above. The streaks below varied from bird to bird, but were reverbeaux. The vertral Streaks were on the breasts +sides, the instreaked belly + undertail were pale butly but not white. They had faint white wingland & a white eye ring. The birds were all in winter plumage. The tails had the pattern of a junco, white on the outside edges. No birds Showed white shoulder patches. The legs were fless color. We deserved a singing male about seven feet up in a tree along the road. The sang was finch-like. They were darker below than Vesper-Spannows and sharter tailed. They were darker below than Lapland Langgars and without the breast smudge aid chestrut find reck. They also appeared smaller. We determined that they were Sniths Longgues.

ON April 9th I returned to the same area and found about wine birds. They appeared the
