VOTE: 4-III, 3-IV

III, I talked to Jack quite a bit about this bird.

III, Time and location ideal for this species in Iowa.

Description satisfactory, but could be a "book description" after 3 1/2 years.

III, Probably should be a IV, no notes taken at the time of observation, bill shape and throat color difference not mentioned, but white wingbar should be diagnostic.

IV, Chiefly due to long delay and no notes taken at time.

III, Sufficient details, even in light of age of record. Area of sighting historically has harbored species, though not regularly.

IV, Description, location, habitat O.K. Not unexpected at this time of year. Large time lapse raises questions, as does description of color as "darker than blue of E. Bluebird". I remember the Lazuli Btg being turquoise-colored almost.

IV, I feel that after this many years the record is very doubtful unless there were notes taken at the time. Bill shape should have been noted. Lazuli Bunting is 2/3 size of Bluebird. Questions on what shade of blue wings and so forth are dependent on light. I've always thought of Lazuli Buntings as rather light blue.

REVOTE (by mail): 4-III, 3-IV

III, Borderline because of late reporting and I don't know the observer.

III, I feel we should dicuss whether to accept old records if no photo, details, or other substantiating evidence is extant to support the sighting. Are we setting a precedent with the Holloway Lazuli Bunting if we accept it on his memory after nearly four years since the sighting?

IV, My problem is with the color. I can be persuaded, as time

may distort impressions of color.

IV, But I want to discuss policy on these old records at the meeting. I don't really doubt it--odd color and size description do argue against it being a book description.

COMMENTS:

The Committee felt that the time lapse between the sighting and the reporting was long enough to raise some doubts as to the accuracy of the description, especially in areas such as the color of the bird. It was suggested that Lazuli Buntings are light blue or turquoise rather than being "darker blue than Eastern Bluebird".

However the Committee encourages reports such as these (if they are not able to be made at the time of observation), as, while they may not be accepted, they are not considered incorrect either, and may add to our knowledge of where and when such rare species as Lazuli Bunting might occur in Iowa.

The opinions expressed here are based on the information available to the Committee and should not necessarily preclude an alternate interpretation by those who observed the bird firsthand.

Any action may be re-reviewed upon submission of additional evidence.

Explanation of Classification:

I = labeled, diagnostic specimen, photograph, or recording available for review by the Committee

II = acceptable sight record documented independently by 3 or more observers

III = acceptable sight record documented by 1 or 2 observers

IV = probably correct record, but not beyond doubt
V = record with insufficient evidence to judge

VI = probably incorrect identification, escapee, or otherwise unacceptable record

Classification is based on the highest category agreed upon by six of seven committee members.
