- Description of bird(s): We were scanning a small flock of Ring-billed Gulls resting on an island below the dam when we observed a larger, darker mantled gull that I immediately recognized as an adult Lesser Black-backed Gull. The bird was noticeably larger than a Ring-bill, but smaller and slimmer than nearby Herring Gulls. The mantle was dark charcoal gray, clearly darker than any of the other gulls present. The head was white with very dark brown streaking, especially on the nape. The eye was yellow. The bill was also yellow with a red smudge near the tip. The underparts were white. In flight, the black primaries contrasted with the dark gray innerwing and mantle.
- Similar species and how eliminated: The combination of size, mantle color, yellow eyes, and yellow legs eliminated other larids, especially California, Herring, and Great Black-backed Gulls.
- Viewing conditions and equipment: Viewing conditions were excellent with the sun behind us. Estimated viewing distance was 35-40 meters. I used 8x40 binoculars and a 20-60x spotting scope.
- Previous experience with species: Very familiar with this species from recent birding in North Carolina, where I have seen >20 in a day. Have also seen several in Iowa and Massachusetts, plus a single bird in Nebraska.

Other Observers: None at the time. Had been discovered the previous weekend, and was seen several times later this day by Steve Dinsmore and Gordon Brown.

Description of bird: White-headed, dark backed gull. Had yellow bill with no dark ring evident and yellow legs. The head had some streaking on it. The bird was sitting on the ice by itself, so there were no other gulls near-by for size comparison. It had much the same look as a Ring-billed with bad lighting, and it took some time before the bird turned enough to see that the mantle and wings were a definite slate gray.

Similar species and how eliminated: Dark mantle eliminated all but Great Black-backed and Slaty-backed. Yellow legs clinched ID (in addition to not being as massive as Great Black-backed).

Viewing conditions (light, distance, optics): Sunny, with light playing tricks with mantle color on several gulls. It was only when the bird walked around some so that the lighting varied that I could be sure it was a legitimate dark-mantled gull. Observed at about 500 yards (or perhaps a bit more) through zoom scope.

Previous experience: First adult I've ever seen.

Habitant & circumstances: Located on an ice shelf above the dam where about 2000 gulls mostly Ring-billed were setting. The bird was located setting alone on the left edge of the group.

Description: The bird was slightly smaller than the Herring gulls present. The gull was easy to locate as it was a typical adult winter Lesser Blackbacked. It had a much darker back and wings than any other gulls present. It had a yellow bill with red mark. The neck, nape, and crown were heavily streaked with dark marks. The legs were yellow the same color as the adult ring-billeds.

Description of voice: N/H.

Similarly appearing species: The gull was to small for Yellow-footed. The size and yellow legs eliminated all other possible black backed gulls.

Distance (how measured): estimated 150yds

Optical equipment: Kowa 20x to 60x Spotting Scope.

Light: sunny excellent light.
