A-D, The date is odd, but Kansas has a 20 Jan record. The most convincing aspect of this record is the behavior. I observed this species in N. Dakota and noted exactly the same behavior. There is virtually no description of the bird itself (except for the tail pattern which is supportive), but don't think this is surprising from an essentially nondescript bird.

A-D, The bird was not seen well, but its call and flight song as described eliminate similar species. The behavior of this bird is also characteristic of the species.

NA, This bird does migrate early and singly and display with call is typical. But I would like to see complete plumage description, leg color etc. for first state record.

NA, Light underwings with buffy body and white outer tail feathers fit either pipit, as does skylarking behavior. The song is more suggestive of American Pipit to me, still an extremely early bird in northern Iowa in February.

NA, The two things that fail this vote for me are: Date: 7 weeks before the earliest record Minn. sighting. Identification by flight song: Lee apparently has no previous experience with Sprague's Pipit. It's song has been described variously as: a "descending series of musical tzee and tzee-a notes", a sound "like tinkling sleigh bells", the sound of "links of chain being coiled", and a song "which resembles the pattern and breezy quality of the Veery's song." Quite the variety of interpretation! Also, if you accept the possibility of breeding-season displays in Feb., you open the possibility of singing Smith's Longspur or others we don't hear in Iowa.

A-D, The behavior, song, and habitat are more convincing to me than the many previous reports that were based on morphology. The white outer tail feathers are supportive. A winter record is not what I expected, but is possible, and, with the warm weather, an early migrant is not out of the range of possibility.

NA, Description of bird, including vocalizations, is convincing. Behavior also seems right for Sprague's Pipit. Problem is date of sighting, although Feb was very warm. The earliest dates for MN & SD are mid Apr, SD has a 30 Mar date. I am inclined to accept but would like to discuss. RE-VOTE (at meeting 4/19/98): 6 A-D, 1 NA

AFTER HIKING ALONG WATERMAN CREEK, I WAS CUTTING ACROSS AN OFEN FIELD WHEN A SPARROW-SIZED BIRD FLWHED IN FRONT OF ME, FLEW A SHORT DISTANCE AND DROPPED BACK INTO THE WEEDS. IT MADE A SHARP, MUSICAL WHEET CALL WHEN FLUSHED. I FLUSHED THE BIRD AGAIN AND WITH THE CALL NOTE, IT ROSE HIGH IN THE AIR, GAVE A CHEE, CHEE, CHEE, CHEE CHEE SONG, TRAILING OF AT THE END AND DROPPED BACK TO THE GROUND, I NOTICED WHITE OWIER TAIL FEATHERS WHEN IT FIRST FLEW, SIMILAR TO A VESTER SPARLOW. I FLUSHED THE BIRD A THIRD TIME AND IT POSE HIGHER WITHERE REPEATING THE SONG SEVERAL TIMES.

THE FOURTH AND FINAL TIME I FLUTHED THE BIRD I WAS ABLE TO GET THE SUN BEHIND ME. IT GAVE THE CALL NOTE AGAIN WHEN FULSHED AND CIRCLED HIGH OVERHEAD, REPEATING THE SONG OVER AND OVER. THE BIRD WAS ALL LIGHT UNDERNEATH WITH BURGY COLORING NOTICEABLE ON THE BODY. IT CIRCLED VERY HIGH AND OFF TO THE WEST OVER THE CREEK UNTIL I LOST SIGHT OF IT.
