Geothlypis Philadelphia.—Baird.

Mourning Warbler.

This bird is considered rare among most collectors. I have found it from Delaware to New York, and from the Atlantic to Iowa, but have never found it breeding. Its habits are very much the same as the *Geothlypis Trichas*.

Geothlypis Macgillivrayi.—Baird.

Macgillivray's Warbler.

I never found this bird until 1874, and then I shot three specimens in one day in the State of Iowa. It resembles the Mourning Warbler in appearance very much, and its habits are very near the same. It is found in Iowa. The specimen is in my collection.
