A-D, Black-capped Chickadee, which has a superficially similar song, is eliminated by call note, size, and plumage.

NA, Reluctantly. Call is right, but description makes me a little nervous. Wouldn't a late fall phoebe look really lemon-yellow underneath? That should jump out at an observer.

A-D, Not unexpected in a mild winter.

NA, Probably correct but the description is not enough to confirm such a rare bird in winter. The song and appearance of Black-capped Chickadee are so different from Eastern Phoebe that it surprises me that they are compared. Fly catching or tail pumping would have convinced me.

NA, Although this species is likely at this date, 'phoebe' could also be a rendering of an empidonax call. 'Dark dull green' does not describe E. Phoebe very well.
