III, Streaks and... top of head convincing.

III, description seems to fit but rather undetailed.

VI, Top of head should be red for H. Finch, also rump and breast should be red, not raspberry. Not convinced it was not a Purple Finch changing from imm. to ad. plumage.

IV, Possible but not well-enough described. Need more info on streaking and bill shape (culmen). Why not Cassin's Finch? In my experience (in NC) House and Purple differences aren't as clearcut as is shown in Peterson's new guide.

III, and Carpodacus in summer/late spr. in Iowa could be either C. purpreus or C. mexicanus. If Jardine is accurate in doc. -- brown back, head and side streaks clinch. REVOTE (at meeting, 20 November 1982): 6-III, 1-IV
