Gulls, Roadrunner, Woodpeckers — Six Bonaparte's Gulls were west of their usual haunts at Squaw Creek Refuge on April 25 (MBR). A notable range extension of the Roadrunner occurred with the first reported lowa observation being obtained 4 miles north of Delta, Keokuk Co. on April 25 (JS, fide JDB). East of its usual range was a Red-shafted Flicker seen on April 10 in St. Louis County, Mo. (HH, fide JEC). The Pileated Woodpecker continues its comeback, with the second modern record for the St. Joseph, Mo. area being reported this season.(FL).

Finches, Sparrows — A Blue Grosbeak was seen at Squaw Creek Refuge on May 26 (MBR). Evening Grosbeaks lingered in Kentucky, with 13 noted at Calhoun, McLean Co. on April 20 (JW, fide ALS) and 1 at Louisville on April 27 (BLM, fide ALS). A large movement of Am. Goldfinches passed through Tiffin, Seneca Co., Ohio, May 7-9 (WCK). Red Crossbills lingered very late, with birds present throughout the period at Cleveland (WAK) and Lakewood, Ohio (OD) and into early June at feeders in lowa (fide WHB). Twelve were noted at Canton, Stark Co., Ohio on June 6 (REB). Lark Buntings were seen at St. Joseph, Mo. on May 16 (FL) and in Nodaway County, Mo. on May 26 (MBR). Sharp-tailed Sparrows were common at Squaw Creek Refuge, May 16-19 (MBR, DE). Smith's
